- Big on personality, four-year-old Markitoff will look to make his presence known on October I3. "I like his demeanor," said Nolan Ramsey, assistant to trainer Mike Maker. "He's a pretty tough gallop. He knows he's the big horse. It takes a special rider to get along with him. He's pretty tough. He likes to test you, so I kind of like his attitude."
- The Kentucky-bred son of Giant's Causeway arrives at the International off a fourth-place finish, just one length out of top spot, in the Grade 1 Northern Dancer Turf on September 15.
- At 3O-1, Markitoff was game to the wire in the 11/2-mile event won by Johnny Bear, an effort that pleased Ramsey. "We do think I I/2 miles is his best distance," he noted. "We only got beat a length in the Northern Dancer. He's doing absolutely great and seems to like it up here. He's good and happy. He holds his weight well."
- Markitoff kicked off the 2018 New Year in style, taking a 11/8-mile turf tilt at Gulfstream on January 1. At 12-1, he won by three-quarters of a length. It was the second straight trip to the winner's circle for the chestnut that ended his '17 campaign with a victory at Keeneland on Oct. 22. "He's a horse that's going to dig in and give you everything he has every time. You saw that in the Northern Dancer."
- Ramsey would love to see more of the same on Saturday. "He had a little issue in the summer and we had to give him a couple of weeks off," he said. "We brought him back and he wasn't quite ready to go at Saratoga (fourth, on August 25), but he still ran a pretty good race against some nice horses. Coming into the Northern Dancer, we expected him to improve."
- "I think the Northern Dancer was one of Markitoff's better races and I expect him to improve off of that. I think all the boxes are checked off and we're looking really good."

Owner - Three Diamonds Farm

Three Diamonds Farm is Kirk Wycoff, along with his wife, Debra, and their family. The stable name represents Wycoff's three children. Son Jordan is the stable's managing partner. The Wycoffs have been involved in racing since the mid-2000s, initially at Mid-Atlantic tracks with trainer Michael Trombetta. Their activity increased after they also began sending horses to trainers Todd Pletcher and Mike Maker, with Maker having most of the stable. Three Diamonds' first Grade I winner was at Woodbine in the 2012 Nearctic, courtesy of Next Question, and Bigger Picture, an astute \$32,000 claim, landed them another in the 2017 United Nations. Both horses represented Three Diamonds in the Breeders' Cup World Championships.

Trainer - Michael Maker

Like top trainers Todd Pletcher and Kiaran McLaughlin, Maker also spent time as an assistant of Hall of Fame trainer D. Wayne Lukas. Under Lukas, Maker helped develop such stars as Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner Charismatic, as well as Breeders' Cup winners Cat Thief, Orientate, Surfside and Spain. Maker, who won the 2009 Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile with Furthest Land and the 2011 Juvenile with Hansen, started his own stable in 2003. Perennially among North America's leading trainers in recent years, Maker won the Queen's Plate with Sir Dudley Digges and the E.P. Taylor with Al's Gal, both in 2016. For the first time this year, he has a string of horses based at Woodbine.

Jockey - Irad Ortiz Jr.

Ortiz was born in Trujillo Alto, Puerto Rico. His younger brother, Jose, is also a leading jockey in New York. Ortiz won his first American race in 2011. In June 2012, Ortiz got his big break when trainer Kiaran McLaughlin put him on the filly Questing. When the filly won, McLaughlin retained Ortiz for the Coaching Club American Oaks at Saratoga in what would become Ortiz's first Grade 1 victory. Questing also won the Alabama Stakes during her Eclipse Award-winning three-year-old campaign. In 2014, Ortiz won 15 graded stakes including his first victory at the Breeders' Cup in the Juvenile Fillies Turf aboard Lady Eli. He rode Stephanie's Kitten to win the 2015 Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf and Bar of Gold to victory in the 2017 Filly & Mare Sprint. In 2017, Ortiz finished first in the North American jockey standings with 318 wins. He was an Eclipse Award finalist along with his brother Jose, who won. In 2018, Ortiz won the Belmont spring/summer and Saratoga meets and earned his 2,000th career win on September 15 aboard Gambler's Fallacy at Belmont Park.
